UPDATE FROM PRESIDENT ROY

Can you believe it is already the 1st of March? Time is just flying by at the museum these days. We have many ongoing projects as you can see from Linda's summary on page 1. I will be updating these projects in upcoming newsletters.

Today we would like to review the Wi-Fi Project that is nearing completion. The project included installing a computer network system, security cameras, and extending the Wi-Fi throughout the museum and Pioneer Hall. Each of these components will need operating procedures on how we implement each of these areas and safeguards to protect people's privacy.

The Governance Committee will start working to develop these procedures on Mondays, during working sessions between 11:00 and 12:00, to present the draft processes to the Board in the future.

Key issues with the networking portion will be the development and management of secure access to our computer files, while keeping some files general and open to more uses. The security and accessibility will include identifying who is currently accessing which files, and the security level needed for each file. Volunteers that need access to the computers will have their own sign-in password. Computer files will be set up so that access will be accorded through the security level assigned to a user's password.

It will take the committee some time to identify what programs people currently access and what programs we need to develop to expand general office computer access that may include public access.

Key issues associated with security cameras will be the development of processes and procedures to identify to all members the camera locations, acceptable uses, administration of the recordings, both audio and video; when the data can be accessed and by whom.

Key issues with the extension of the Wi-Fi connections throughout the museum, Pioneer Hall, and outside of the building will be the development and management of current uses of the Museum Wi-Fi, and research technology that will enable visitors to use the Wi-Fi system to expand their visit into the digital world as well as the visual world within the museum.

A special thank you to Bill Pritchard for sharing his time and expertise and helping us to get our technology up to date.

If you would like to be involved in the development of any of these programs, please let us know. All members are welcome to attend any committee meetings or the board meetings.

Hope you and your family are doing well, we look forward to seeing you all around the Museum.




THE FOLLOWING ARE **FULLY FUNDED:**

- Updating of our technology; which is being done in phases. Phase 1 is nearing completion and has included wiring and hardware to upgrade Wi-Fi, networking and replacing and/or upgrading software and computers, and installing cameras. Phase II will be upgrading technology at Pioneer Hall and Phase III will be adding cameras outside for additional security.
- The construction of the new building to display our fire engines has been fully funded and will be a beautiful way to display these beauties making them more accessible for the public to enjoy. (City permitting is a slow process!)

MICHELE HEIDERER, our research librarian continues to receive inquiries about properties, families and, yes, a missing gun (page 5).

Danya, a homeowner inquired about the history of her property on Burn Road. Michele was able to provide information on most of the previous owners and how the land was used.

David was interested in his Condit family who he thought settled in the Kent's Prairie area. Michele was able to verify that they most certainly lived there near Frank Kent and other early families in that area. She also provided him with stories from the *Arlington Times* about his ancestor who was a minister in the area and other early relatives.



Our latest mystery...do you have the answer? We're looking for a pistol!

Transcribed from May 31, 1951 Arlington Times:

"OTTO EITZENBERGER FINDS OLD PISTOL"

While plowing a field on the Eitzenberger farm near Silvana, Otto Eitzenberger turned up the rusted remains of a pistol of doubtful vintage.

The weapon appears to be a .32 caliber. The wood has rotted from the handle, leaving the framework of the grip of solid brass, and also the receiver of brass, while the barrel, 12 inches long, is of iron.

It looks like a breach loader, and bears the number 10,274. The land where the relic was found was cleared in 1916 and it formerly was a beaver swamp, thus the supposition is that the weapon might have belonged to a beaver trapper.

The relic is on display in The Times window."

And, another request....



Michael "Tug" Buse has contacted the SVM. He is trying to unravel the mystery of where this gun might be now. While Mr. Eitzenberger never married, Michele Heiderer, our research librarian has been able to locate a living relative and has given that information to Mr. Buse. Also, he has been able to spend time with Loren Kraetz who remembers seeing the pistol in 1951 and with his help, Mr. Buse has created a drawing of the pistol.

Mr. Buse says his research suggests that the pistol was an expensive, rare, custom made gentleman's personal defense weapon, probably made before the year 1790. He theorizes the pistol may have been carried up the Stillaguamish River in 1803 by an officer aboard the *Guatamozin*, an American fur trading vessel.

Do you have any old records or information pertaining to the Vasa Order of America, an early fraternal organization in Arlington supporting Swedish immigrants? They promoted Swedish culture and Scandinavian heritage through events and fellowship. There was a two-story building on the southeast corner of 67th and 172nd (that corner in Edgcomb where the two streets cross. Today that corner is a protected wetlands area. The main floor was a church, possibly the 7th Day Adventist Church, and the second story was a dance hall where the Vasa group met and held meetings and various functions.

From the Vasa archives: The Vasa group in Arlington, #394, was founded on November 10, 1920 and disbanded in 1969.

UPDATE ON OUR PHOTO COLLECTIONS SUE WALDE

Thousands of negatives and slides were found in storage. With a goal of doing another video project about Arlington's history; Sue has digitized approximately 16,000 slides and negatives of pictures taken over the past 75 years with most being in the Arlington area. Despite their age, many of the images are in good condition. However, some show wear from time and are now preserved before further deterioration occurs. As we move forward, the next crucial tasks of this project are cataloging the 16,000 images and scanning and cataloging another 1,000 pictures that have been donated over the past three years. Many of these photos are over 100 years old and scanning them will preserve them forever.
